NCEC holds its first neighborhood elections

Earlier this June, Neal Baxter and I attended the first Neighborhood Community Engagement Commission (NCEC) Neighborhood Elections in Southeast Minneapolis. The 16-member NCEC will make recommendations to the City Council about how funding will be allocated to neighborhood groups throughout Minneapolis. Through a series of neighborhood meetings the city of Minneapolis was divided up into eight districts, with each area having a representative. Bancroft has been placed in District 7 along with many of our neighboring 'hoods' to the north, east and west.

Electors and/or alternates from six of the nine District 7 neighborhoods were represented; five of the eight candidates came; and the election process was facilitated by the League of Women Voters. Working in District groups, the candidates explained why they wanted to serve on the NCEC, described their backgrounds and qualifications, and responded to questions. We had an impressive group of candidates that brought a wealth of community service background, diversity and knowledge to the table. After three rounds of voting, Melanie Majors was elected as the first District 7 representative to the NCEC.

Melanie is a long-time Minneapolis resident who currently lives in the Bryant neighborhood. She is the Executive Director of the Greater Longfellow neighborhood, and firmly believes that properly funded neighborhoods play a vital role in shaping a stable and vibrant city. Melanie's solid understanding of the Neighborhood Revitalization Program (NRP) qualifies her to speak with first-hand knowledge about what works well and should be preserved. We believe that Melanie will do an excellent job representing the interests of not only our District but the city as a whole.

Bancroft Neighborhood and 'Diva Rags' team up

We must work as a collective to make change, and that is exactly what we will do. At the June board meeting the Bancroft Neighborhood Association (BNA) agreed to partner with the Diva/Suave Project-Junior Business Incubator as their fiscal agent, helping out as they search for grants to apply for non-profit status from the government. Both organizations are excited to be making a collaborative effort toward uplifting, educating and guiding at-risk youth and children in the right direction — simply

because the youth are our future.

Ashley Lauren is an entrepreneur who started Diva Rags at fifteen and recently began the Diva/Suave Project, which began in April of 2007 where it operated out of the Midtown Global Market.

“Diva Rags” are scarves, shawls, sarongs, etc, embellished with a unique application of glitter, paint and/or gems (every product is washable). Suave Clothing, which was recently added to Diva Rags, offers customized clothing, where the consumer may place a special design on used/new apparel and

shoes. Diva Rags and Suave Clothing serve as examples for young people, and help at-risk youth and children in the neighborhood realize there are options in life besides what poverty hands them at a young age. Ashley has a passion for fashion as well as uplifting the youth.

The Diva/Suave Project-Junior Business Incubator and Diva Rags & Suave Clothing are currently located at 1832 E. 42nd St. The project gives young people training, mentoring and the necessary skills to become small businesses owners while also offering a wealth of other resources. These future entrepreneurs will create jobs for people in the community and influence peers to utilize their time in a positive way. The Diva/Suave Project and the Junior Business Incubator is an effort to diminish the epidemics of unemployment, illiteracy, teen pregnancy, gang violence leading to young murders, homelessness, hunger, and the rising number of high school dropouts. It's time to give back to the community by molding the youth, our future, in a strengthening way. This will help lay the foundation for their future.

Ashley's inspiration for implementing change among young people derives from her grandfather, Danny Davis, who passed away approximately one year ago from cancer. He was a Golden Gloves boxing champ, compliance specialist for the Minneapolis Public Schools, and founder of Let's Work Together Club, an organization that issued scholarships to disadvantaged youth throughout Minneapolis who were going to attend college. His work will live on through Ashley who will carry on the torch her grandfather and past leaders ignited!

Revived activities bring life to Phelps Park

For years there were no Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board games at Phelps Park, located on 39th Street & Chicago Avenue. That all changed last year and, if you haven't noticed, the park is experiencing new life and excitement! Roughly one year ago the Phelps Activity Council, a non-profit organization, was founded to receive donations to help cover the costs of providing a good activities program for local kids coming to play organized sports in the park. Many neighborhood groups, foundations and private donors have contributed to PAC over the years. This year we are excited to include the Bancroft Neighborhood Association to that list. Their financial donation will help cover the costs for baseball jerseys for this year's teams. Without donations like these many kids would not have had a chance to participate, leaving them without a physically active, team building, and community-minded activity to participate.

Jim Halbur, who for many years has been the pastor of a neighborhood church, Fountain of Life, and is president of the Phelps Activities Council, says, "It is a whole different atmosphere with organized activities going on. It is especially noticeable at night

with the lights on. It keeps the park inviting and safe. What a great thing for the community."

John Ross, a park worker at Phelps, noticed, "It has been a definite improvement and positive impact . . . on days when the teams are having practice the park is easily manageable and calmer and it has developed a sense of pride in the community."

Mark Graves, director of the Boys and Girls Club, who has been at the park for many years, has seen the positive impact of the program on the park, especially on the day there were about eight football teams scrimmaging each other. "It's a great thing to see," he said.

The vision behind the PAC is to help Phelps Park and the Boys & Girls Club become a place to help develop character in kids through various activities. The new funding from groups like Bancroft Neighborhood Association and individuals, along with the hard work of coaches and other volunteers, is making a difference in the Phelps neighborhood.

BNA home improvement loans available

The Bancroft Neighborhood Association (BNA) has home improvement loans available to Bancroft residents at a fixed rate of 3% for homesteaded property and 6% for non-homesteaded property owners. Loans may be between \$1,500.00 and \$15,000.00. All permanent interior and exterior projects are eligible for this loan program, with the exception of projects deemed “luxury items for the Bancroft Neighborhood.” These would include in-ground pools, hot tubs, garages over 576 square feet and luxury landscaping. With each Bancroft Loan, we ask you contribute five volunteer hours toward the BNA project, committee, board meeting of your choice.
