So we have snow... now what?

eeping our sidewalks free of ice and snow is not only the neighborly thing to do, it's the law. For your own benefit and to help your neighbors, especially those pushing strollers or using wheelchairs, and to help the many people in Minneapolis who walk, please do your part. Minneapolis ordinance requires that property owners clear sidewalks after the end of a snowfall within 24 hours for homes and duplexes, and 4 daytime hours (which begin at 8:00 a.m.) for apartment and commercial buildings.

Property owners are required to shovel the sidewalks on all sides of their property, the full width of the sidewalk down to the bare pavement. If you're unable to do this on your own, there are community groups that can help. They can be reached at (612) 673-3004.

After shoveling and clearing your sidewalks, spreading sand or ice-melting material is helpful. The city offers several sites where residents can pick up free sand for their residential sidewalks. The closest location to Bancroft is on East 27th Street, just East of Longfellow Avenue and is open 24-hours-a-day. Residents must bring their own pail and shovel.

40th and Cedar being reviewed — send us your input!

The City of Minneapolis is currently looking at the intersection of 40th and Cedar. There have been reports of unsafe car movements at this intersection that spurred a review of the situation. The observation and analysis was conducted at the intersection on Sept. 24 between 4:00-6:00 p.m.

During the two-hour time frame, there were 32 incidents of non-compliance with traffic laws: 18 by drivers of a motorized vehicle, 8 by pedestrians, and 6 by bicyclists. Of the infractions by those driving motorized vehicles, eight were drivers making illegal left turns from 40th Street onto Cedar Avenue. In five of the pedestrian incidents, a person hit the crosswalk button, but the signal didn't react fast enough. They crossed the road when there was a break in the traffic, but before the signal changed, which resulted in a "ghost signal."

At this time, some initial signage modifications have been added to the intersection. Councilmember Glidden's office believes that a more extensive modification to the intersection is needed for traffic, bicycle, and pedestrian safety. To this end, they are proposing a median on Cedar, which would physically prevent cars from turning left from 40th Street onto Cedar. This would be similar to the median on Chicago Avenue at 40th Street.

Installing a median at this intersection will mean that some on-street parking will be lost. City staff is still analyzing how many spaces (how many feet) of parking will be lost.

We are in the planning stages and input from our neighborhood would be great. We have plenty of garden projects, so if you have a green thumb or want to get your hands dirty, come and join us.

Chicago Avenue Fire Arts Center, Winter Quarter 2013

The Chicago Avenue Fire Arts Center is pleased offer all the old favorite classes as well as some brand-new offerings, and you can register for them on-line at www.cafac.org/classes. In 2012, we were grateful recipients of a capital grant from the Pohlad Family Foundation which has been used to help us launch three new programs areas at CAFAC:

- Foundry: developed and taught by long-time CAFAC instructors Roger Karlson and Ryan Salmon, along with our new Volunteer/ Gallery Coordinator Jessica Tank, our foundry program will initially focus on aluminum before moving into bronze and other metals. Roger, Ryan, and Jessica have all worked extensively with Wayne Potratz, renowned cast metal sculptor and professor of art at the U of M.
- Stained glass: We're lucky to have Jeff Goetz leading our new stained glass program. Jeff brings an extensive background and wealth of knowledge in stained glass artistry and craftsmanship, with a particular focus on historic glass and preservation. We've been busy turning our mezzanine level into the glass workshop and are eager to welcome students to it.
- Flameworking: aka torchworking or lampworking, this fun and fascinating art form adds another layer to our glass program. Mary Ila Duntemann has developed and will teach our flameworking classes, bringing her lifelong fascination with glass beads as well as years as a flamework artist, producing work for galleries, art shows, and commissions.

All of our old favorites, Oxy-Acetylene, Found Object Sculpture, and Blacksmithing Basics are also available and fill quickly, so don't hesitate. We've got two special offerings of our OA Found Object Sculpture class this December/January: a three-day intensive version for youth, and a three-week winter break version for adults.

Returning students — Reheater spots are also limited and popular. But now we've got another option for those of you looking for extended shop time: our SPARC (that's Studio Pass at Reduced Cost) program. Geared towards students with intermediate/advanced skills on our industrial floor, SPARC lets you purchase a package of shop hours on a monthly or (for even great savings) quarterly basis. Update on 38th & Bloomington

BNA would like to welcome Tesoro gas station to the neighborhood. The signage is not yet complete, but they are open for business. Stop in and say hello to Patrick and support this locally-owned business. This is the first step in a freshening up of the 38th & Bloomington intersection. We're currently working with a few other businesses on that corner to improve and update the façades of the buildings: Southside Farm Store, Marla's Caribbean Cuisine, and the orange building on the Northwest corner. Look for changes starting in the Spring!

There are still commercial improvement funds available! Businesses may apply for up to \$5,000 in funding, and owners must match dollar-for-dollar all BNA monies received. Funds must be used for permanent exterior building work that improves the "curb appeal" of the

businesses. Painting, stucco work, awnings, exterior lighting, parking lots, and landscaping are a few of the projects that qualify for funds. For more information, contact the BNA office at 612-724-5313.



Pillsbury House Theatre's **Breaking Ice Company** confronts neighborhood revitalization

reaking Ice uses research-based improvisation to create thought-provoking, often funny, performances that entertain while inspiring safe conversations about controversial topics. For 16 years, Breaking Ice has been working with institutions, businesses, and nonprofits to help them confront topics related to diversity and communication that are often difficult to discuss. Professional actors and theatre-based improvisations and scenes provide a powerful and entertaining way to step back and get a fresh perspective while gaining a more intimate understanding of how individuals relate to each other.

This special Breaking Ice production explores how the Bancroft neighborhood is responding to development and change. It asks questions about the confusing word "gentrification" and how neighborhoods can evolve in economically stable and sustainable ways. The topics addressed in these performances will be generated from interviews with people who live, work, and go to school in the Bancroft neighborhood, but are relevant to all city residents. More information on dates and times will be coming, but the locations of the performances will be Bancroft Elementary, El Colegio, and Bethel Lutheran Church.

This production is one of the twenty art experiences in the Arts on Chicago initiative, an arts-based community development project led by Pillsbury House + Theatre with partners Upstream Arts, the Bancroft Neighborhood Association, PPNA, and MCAD Professor Natasha Pestich with support from the Ward 8 Council Office of Elizabeth Glidden.

35W bridge survivor creates new organization, 'courageous heARTS'

nspired by her own healing journey through art, Lindsay Walz was driven to manifest her life's ambition: to create her own youth center.

35W bridge survivor Lindsay (Petterson) Walz is launching a new organization, courageous heARTS, with a special screening of a 2013 Academy Award-winning documentary to show Aug. 1 at the Riverview Theater in Minneapolis. "Inocente" follows the story of a homeless and undocumented Latino youth, and highlights the transformative power of art. The event starts at 5:00 p.m. and will be followed by a panel discussion with the film's subject, Inocente Izucar.

courageous heARTS is an artsbased youth center in south Minneapolis that emphasizes process over product, and expression over technique. Inspired by her own healing experiences, Walz believes process-oriented creativity can be a powerful catalyst for personal growth and transformation and an effective way to heal trauma.

Early in her own recovery from the collapse, Walz discovered a community education class titled "soul painting" that employed process-oriented painting. This method was instrumental in helping Walz manage the PTSD she developed as a result of the collapse, and inspired her guiding philosophy for courageous heARTS: that healing requires courage, not a diagnosis, and that creating art in a space free from judgment can open new worlds of possibility.

Fulfilling a dream she has held since she was a youth herself, Walz feels akin to many young people she has worked with during her years as a youth worker in Minneapolis. "They've had the ground fall out from underneath them too," says Walz, "it just wasn't covered on the evening news." Walz is reminded of the many ways youth experience their own heart hurts: bullying, poverty, homelessness, abuse, and addiction, to name a few.

Walz recalls sitting on the crumbled remains of the 35W bridge in the middle of the Mississippi River in inexplicable calm immediately following the collapse. Walz states that in one of those nascent moments, she realized the personal meaning of the tragedy that had just befallen her: to make her dream of starting her own youth center a reality. Six years after the collapse, Walz has manifested that dream.

Welcome STEP-UP interns

his summer, the Bancroft Neighborhood Association will host two interns from the STEP-UP program. STEP-UP is the City of Minneapolis jobs program for youth ages 14-21. As one of the country's premier youth employment programs, STEP-UP recruits, trains, and places low-income young people in jobs with a wide range of Twin Cities businesses, nonprofits, and public agencies. STEP-UP serves a population that faces the greatest barriers to employment, particularly low income young people and youth of color (93% of interns are youth of color).

STEP-UP partners with over 70 nonprofit employers each summer to help interns explore diverse career interests, gain valuable on-the-job skills, make strong professional connections and prepare for meaningful careers. Wages for interns are paid by the STEP-UP program. In addition to working, interns are required to attend a work readiness class for 3 hours a week to enhance their work experience.

Our interns this year are Mawa and Antonio. Be sure to say hello when you see them at any of our events this summer.

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My STEP-UP Experience

The STEP-UP youth program helps teens get a better understanding of real-life work experiences. The teens work for small businesses, corporations, government departments, and nonprofits throughout the summer. They are paid minimum wage and can work up to 27-hours a week. During that time, they are required to attend a weekly 3-hour class that supports their skills as an employee (whether it's punctuality, answering phones, or gardening).

I first heard of the STEP-UP program from a friend at school. He told me that I could work over the summer and get paid, too. I went to the library to do some research and find more information. The application process was a learning experience, too.

What I hope to get out of this experience is to have fun, improve my skills as a worker, and find out what types of jobs I like and don't like. I am excited to help the Bancroft Neighborhood Association and the Bancroft community.

Bancroft Elementary receives IB Authorization

This May Bancroft Elementary became authorized as an International Baccalaureate World School offering the Primary Years Program (IB-PYP). The PYP is a world-renowned curriculum framework from the International Baccalaureate (IB) designed to encourage students to be active learners, well-rounded individuals and engaged world citizens. The Primary Years Programme targets learners in High 5 through 5th grade and aims to create a relevant, engaging, challenging and significant educational environment for all children.

The process took three years and included many hours of staff training and mobilization. "One of the most exciting parts about this process is

how staff have come together with a common purpose. The IB-PYP requires extensive teamwork within and across grade levels," says Sue Francis, IB Coordinator at Bancroft. Principal Erin Glynn applauded the IB program as a way to promote student inquiry in a diverse student body. "The IB curriculum engages every kind of learner and instills in them a lifelong curiosity and love of learning," she says.

With this authorization Bancroft joins a growing group of IB schools within the MPS system. For a tour or more information, come by the school or call 612-668-3550. The office is closed but will reopen for the fall on Aug. 14.

National Night Out – Start planning now!

Whether it's your first time planning an event or you're continuing a tradition of years on your block, keep this link bookmarked so when you are ready, you can online at www.minneapolismn.gov/nno/nno_register or through 311. Remember! If you want to block your street, you can do so for free through July 23. Not all streets can be blocked, depending on traffic flow. From July 24 through August 1, there is a \$100 fee.

After August 1, no applications for blocking off a street will be allowed.

As we have many times in the

past, participation by Minneapolitans outranked all U.S. cities with a population over 250,000 in 2012. Over 1,360 events were registered. Can we do that again? We hope so!

Carrot Initiative and Seward Co-op work to bring healthy food to Bryant

The Carrot Initiative began as a living room conversation about the lack of access to fresh, healthy groceries in the community. This lead to the formation of the Carrot Initiative — a Minnesota nonprofit organization located in South Minneapolis.

Multiple community outreach efforts made it clear that the community desperately needed a neighborhood grocer centered around the Carrot Initiative's core principles: variety, sustainability, cultural sensitivity, affordability, accessibility, education, and dedication to the community.

The Carrot Initiative met with staff from Seward Co-op, and Seward Co-op is proposing a second store, the Seward-Friendship store, on the corner of 38th Street and 3rd Avenue at the former Greater Friendship Baptist Church location.

Bancroft resident helps approach Congress on climate change

Bancroft resident Stan Sattinger Precently joined fellow citizens from across the U.S. and Canada in seeking Congressional support for a carbon fee and rebate program designed to reduce climate-upsetting greenhouse gas emissions.

The Citizens Climate Lobby wrapped up a three-day national conference in Washington, DC at the end of June with 370 volunteers conducting meetings with 439 House and Senate offices. CCL members emphasized that clean energy sources (wind, solar, water, and biomass) are currently at a disadvantage versus carbonbased fossil fuels (coal, oil, and gas), because the health, security, and environmental costs of fossil fuels to society are not reflected in the price that's now paid for them. Correcting this distortion would curb emissions by reducing the demand for fossil fuels and speeding the transitions to renewable energy sources.

The proposed program would impose a yearly-increasing fee on fossil fuels at each point of supply. All revenues collected would be returned to consumers as rebates or credits on income taxes, with an estimated twothirds of households enjoying a net benefit. CCL members told the Congressional staffs that there's still time for them to act, particularly if they want to avoid the use of increased federal regulations to reduce heat-trapping gases. The feeand-dividend plan would also have several advantages over a cap-andtrade approach. More information on this market-based solution is available

Is your bike registered?

In an effort to track stolen bicycles that are recovered, the City has a Bicycle Registration Program. There are many reasons why it's important to register your bicycle:

- Bicycle Identification. If a bike is stolen from the street, a car, or home, the owner needs the serial number to report the theft to the police. Most people don't keep this number handy. However, when a bicycle is registered the police can recall information quickly from the computer. The registration records are cross-referenced by name as well as by serial number and registration number.
- Recovered Bikes Returned to Owners. Registering your bike greatly increases the likelihood it will be returned to you if recovered. Bicycles that are registered have a much greater chance of being returned to you if they are lost or stolen and then recovered; bicycles that are not registered have a limited chance of being returned to you if they are recovered.
- Identification of Rider. Bicycle Registration also aids in the identification of the bicycle owner in case of a crash. Many bicyclists don't carry identification with them —this is especially true for children, as most children do not carry identification. What would happen if a child were



involved in a bike crash? It could take hours for emergency personnel to make positive identification and contact a parent. If a child's bicycle were registered, the parent would be contacted quickly.

• Registration Helps With Planning. Bicycle Registration also provides valuable data to city planners, which helps in the design of facilities and educational programs aimed at making bicycling safer.

You can register your bike on the City's website or by calling 311. You simply need to provide your contact information, bike serial number (locat-

ed on bottom of crank shaft or on the fork supporting the handle bars), and other basic bicycle information. You only need to register once (not annually like some programs) unless you need to update contact information or bicycle details, in which case you would need to re-register your bicycle.
