Community garden plots

BNA oversees the community garden located at Bethel Lutheran Church on 16th Avenue and 40th Street. There are 13 garden plots that are 10 feet x 20 feet, and currently a few are available to rent for this growing season. There is a \$30 fee, plus a refundable \$50 deposit, for each plot which includes water, access to seeds, and various plant donations. There is a limit of one garden plot per household and preference is given to residents of Bancroft neighborhood. If you're interested, contact the BNA office to be put on the list. Eligible people will be notified by April.

Curb Appeal Lottery

The BNA Curb Appeal Lottery is back for 2020! This program allows eligible participants to apply for up to \$1,000 in matching grant funds, to be used for home improvement projects. The program covers exterior projects and all projects must be visible from the sidewalk.

Bancroft homeowners and property owners of non-commercial properties with up to four units are eligible to participate in the program. The property must be located in the Bancroft neighborhood. The project is available only to existing properties, not new construction. Renters are encouraged to work with their landlord to apply. Businesses and commercial property owners are not eligible to participate in this program, but contact the BNA office for a list of our commercial programs.

Applications need to be completed and turned in by April 30. The drawing will take place at the May 7 board meeting (need not be present to win). More information and the application checklist can be found at bancroft-neighborhood.org/curbappeallottery

Date night, family night, or a hang-out-with-friends night, each Movies Under the Domes evening is free to the public. Movie-goers can RSVP through Eventbrite for General Admission tickets, as seating is limited. The first 100 people through the door at each movie will receive a gift from Pepsi.

STEP-UP is the City of Minneapolis internship program for young adults ages 14-21. Each year, STEP-UP recruits, trains and places more than 1,600 Minneapolis youth in meaningful paid internships with over 220 top Twin Cities businesses, public agencies and nonprofits.

As one of the country's premiere youth employment programs, STEP-UP serves youth who face some of the greatest barriers to employment, particularly youth from low income families, youth of color, youth from immigrant families, and youth with disabilities. Since it started in 2003, STEP-UP has created nearly 27,000 meaningful internships for youth, helping young people to gain 21st-century skills, build professional connections, explore career interests

and begin the path to educational and career success. Youth complete a competitive application process and work readiness training to be considered for a position with one of over 230 participating businesses in both public and private sector.

Minneapolis youth, ages 14-21, who want to change their life with professional skills training, great onthe-job experience and connections with adult professionals are encouraged to sign up for the STEP-UP program. MN African American Heritage Museum collecting protest art

from Memorialize the Movement

WE LIVE and Global Shapers have partnered with the Minnesota African American Heritage Museum and Gallery (MAAHMG) to collect the powerful artwork that emerged from the protests of the killing of George Floyd. The artwork documents the emotions of the community and the movement against police brutality and systemic racism against Black people. The plywood art that was created on boarded up businesses is being collected to document this historic movement where Minneapolis was the epicenter and it spread throughout the world. An exhibition to be displayed at MAAHMG is being planned for early 2021. The collection and documentation process is delicate and sensitive as it involves art that was created out of collective Black pain, the death of George Floyd, and the fight for justice. We want to ensure that we give respect and honor.

We are working with various busi-

nesses, organizations, and the artists in Minneapolis and St. Paul to document and preserve the art in a safe and permanent location. MAAHMG does not intend to take ownership of any of the collected artwork as ownership of any artwork always remains with the artists who created the work. We also understand that it was made by and for the community and we would like to see the artwork permanently housed in a permanent George Floyd memorial. MAAHMG, WE LIVE, and Global Shapers are only doing their part to collect, document, and preserve the artwork until a permanent home for such works has been determined. We do not want this important part of history to be lost or destroyed.

STEP-UP Interns at Meridian Garden

BNA will again this summer host five interns through the City of Minneapolis STEP-UP program. The interns, ages 14–15, will learn about gardening, permaculture, and the impor-

tance of sustainability. The program spans five weeks, from mid-July to mid-August. Say hello if you're going by the garden and they're working.

The Meridian Garden, located along 38th Street E. at 12th Ave. S., is a community food forest installed and maintained by BNA. Anything that is grown there is for the broader community to come harvest and enjoy. If you'd like to volunteer to weed, we appreciate that, too! And remember when you're in the garden to adhere to social distancing.

Update to Security Rebate Program

BNA has funds left in the Security Rebate Program. This program is an incentive for basic security enhancements to homes in the Bancroft neighborhood. BNA will provide a rebate of up to \$50 for eligible safety-related improvements. All residential properties in the Bancroft neighborhood may receive a rebate without regard to participation in other BNA programs. The Southside Summit: A convening of community leaders on key issues

On November 9, 11, and 13, the first annual Southside Summit will bring together a slate of expert panelists and community leaders to share ways that people, resources, and direct action are fueling essential community change and growth.

The Southside Summit is a virtual conference organized into six interactive workshops over three days. Each workshop is focused on a key community issue. Participants can purchase an all-access pass at southsidesummit mpls.org to gain access to one or all workshops. In an effort to ensure access to the summit, stipends are available to those who need one.

Key Community Issues

Housing Justice: The need for systems, policies, and investments that support accessible, affordable, and habitable housing for all is essential for healthy communities. Develop a better understanding of types of renter protections and new cooperative housing strategies that support affordability as paths to housing justice.

Education Justice: Dive into the need for educational justice within often-marginalized student groups that include kids who identify as a child of color, have a disability, and/or live in a low-income household.

Equitable Development: There are a wide range of definitions for equitable development. In many cases,

increasing access to and ownership of physical properties and businesses among communities of color is considered a goal. Learn how nonprofit business incubators and associations are investing in the recovery of local entrepreneurs and advocating for public and private aid.

Environmental Justice: The alarming need to support real solutions to climate change continues to grow in every corner of the world and across every community. The impact of various legislation, ordinances, lack of regulation, and wealth inequity continue to drive calls for environmental justice within many marginalized communities where high percentages of folks identify as a person of color and/or low-income. Gain insight into programs and policies that can further combat climate change.

Livability & Safety: These days safety is a loaded word. In light of the civil uprising brought about by the murder of George Floyd at the hands of then Minneapolis Police officers, questions are rising related to what systems and which people can best contribute to the safety of everyone. Take a deeper look at what we can do to actively address safety and livability that moves beyond the reactionary and seeks proactive solutions.

Self-Care & Wellness: Overall community health and wellness is directly

George Floyd Square update

Andy Brown, from 38th & Park, and a crew are building a new medical hut, which will sit in the Speedway lot all winter. The hut replaces the med tent that burned a couple of weeks ago. They are also building a greenhouse for the plants and offerings at the Cup Foods bus stop. This is the stop where George Floyd took his last breath.

Caylie, one of our movement "caterers," will move into the spare kitchen at Calvary Lutheran Church soon. This space will facilitate cooking for events and feeding barricade sentries, and offer cooking classes for young folks.

We always need more neighbors to sit as sentries on the barricades, especially at Elliot and 38th Street.

Bahai Center, 3744 Chicago, will continue its food shelf on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 3-5 p.m.. There is also a little food pantry at Bethel Lutheran (4120 17th Ave. S.) that is accessible every day.

We will celebrate the Dia de los Muertos holiday, to honor the area dead, from Oct. 31 to Nov. 2.

Jaenelle Austin, head of the Preservation wing of the movement, is working out a semi-permanent home for the art offerings, which are housed in Pillsbury House. Pillsbury House has said the art is fine in their building for as long as needed.

Negotiations with the City are seeing progress, but we can't speak yet to when the streets may open or on what basis.

GiveMN launched in 2009 as a collaborative venture led by Minnesota Community Foundation and many other organizations committed to helping make our state a better place. 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Bike registration has benefits

In an effort to track stolen bicycles that are recovered, the City has a Bicycle Registration Program. There are many reasons why it's important to register your bicycle:

Bicycle Identification. If a bike is stolen from the street, a car, or home, the owner needs the serial number to report the theft to the police. Most people don't keep this number handy. However, when a bicycle is registered the police can recall information quickly from the computer. The registration records are cross-referenced by name as well as by serial number and registration number.

Recovered Bikes Returned to Owners. Registering your bike greatly increases the likelihood it will be returned to you if recovered. Bicycles that are registered have a much greater chance of being returned to you if they are lost or stolen and then recovered; bicycles that are not registered have a limited chance of being returned to you if they are recovered.

Identification of Rider. Bicycle Registration also aids in the identification of the bicycle owner in case of a crash. Many bicyclists don't carry identification with them—this is especially true for children, as most children do not carry identification. What would happen if a child were involved in a bike crash? It could take hours for emergency personnel to make positive identification and contact a parent. If a child's bicycle were registered, the parent would be contacted quickly.

Registration Helps With Planning. Bicycle Registration also provides valuable data to city planners, which helps in the design of facilities and educational programs aimed at making bicycling safer.

You can register your bike at wCMS1P-135608 or by calling 311. You simply need to provide your contact information, bike serial number (located on bottom of crank shaft or on the fork supporting the handle bars), and other basic bicycle information. You only need to register once (not annually like some programs) unless you need to update contact information or bicycle details, in which case you would need to re-register.

How energy-efficient is your neighborhood?

In January, the City of Minneapolis launched a one-of-a-kind energy disclosure for homes being sold in the city. Energy efficiency has consistently been a part of the conversation for people buying and selling homes and this policy allows people to see how efficiently homes use energy.

The map is growing of homes that have received an energy score. You can view the scores in your neighborhood by visiting mncee.org/tish/yourscore

The City of Minneapolis provides resources for people to make costeffective energy improvements on their homes:

- Up to \$1,000 in cash-back rebates
- Up to \$500 in energy tax credits
- 0% interest loans for the upfront cost

To make this all possible, the City Minneapolis and CenterPoint Energy have partnered with local nonprofit, Center for Energy and Environment, to provide an Energy Advisor service to assist homeowners with energy upgrades.

Free Meal Boxes from MPS

Minneapolis Public Schools (MPS) is offering FREE meal boxes to all youth 18 & under. This program is open to all families; youth do not need to be enrolled in MPS to receive meal boxes. Meal boxes provide a full week of meals for every kid, 18 and under, in the family. All meals meet MPS' high standards for nutrition and quality ingredients, ranging from comforting favorites like pizza and tamales to new tastes like local watermelon radishes. Families can pick-up free meal boxes at sites across Minneapolis, Monday-Friday (school days) — including at Roosevelt and South High.

Most sites are open 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., and a handful of sites have extended hours of 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Youth,

Don't get ticketed or towed

Stay informed about Snow Emergencies. Knowing when a Snow Emergency is in effect is one of the best ways to avoid a ticket and tow in the winter. There are numerous ways to stay informed including email and text alerts, automated phone calls, Facebook, Twitter, and even by using an app on your smart phone.
