Minneapolis streetlights: Brighter isn't better

Minneapolis will be investing millions of dollars in its streetlights over the next few years. The updated wiring and the transition to LED fixtures will improve reliability and save energy, but it's critical that the city pick the right LED fixtures. Unshielded or partially-shielded 'horizontal cutoff' fixtures will shine bright light into yards and homes, creating an unwelcoming outdoor environment that will disrupt neighborhood life, while the light shining through windows will disrupt sleep. Poorly shielded light also shines in the eyes of drivers and pedestrians, reducing public safety, and also dazzles the eyes of residents, reducing their ability to see any threats hidden in the shadows. For these reasons, full cutoff (not just horizontal cutoff) lights are what residents deserve.

Residents also deserve warm-color lights below 3,000 Kelvin (K).

Higher temperature lights, such as 4,000K emit a lot of blue light which shuts down melatonin production. Melatonin is the body's master 'sleep' signal, and without it sleep is disrupted. In the short term this leads to daytime sleepiness and brain fog, but in the long term it can lead to serious health problems including cancer, diabetes, obesity, and bipolar depression. In cities where 4000K lights have been installed residents report the harsh blue light makes them feel like they're in a prison, and in some cities the residents have forced the city to make costly retrofits to replace the 4000K lights with healthier, more welcoming 3000K lights. Minneapolis should protect the health of its residents and avoid a costly retrofit by installing 3000K or lower fixtures.

The city can go even further to improve its streetlights by using widely-available smart lights. Smart lights with timers can be bright during hours with high traffic, and then dim

late at night when few cars are present. Smart lights with motion sensors can be dim when no one is present, but can instantly switch to full brightness when a pedestrian approaches. Intelligent 'on demand' lighting solutions will save the city money over time, and will reduce the demand for electricity, while also ensuring light is there when we need it.

Minneapolis residents deserve reliable LED streetlights, but to protect the health and safety of residents and the vibrancy of neighborhoods those LED streetlights need to be fully shielded (not just horizontally shielded), warm color 3000K or lower, and they need to be smart lights that provide light when and where it's needed, instead of blazing at full brightness when no one is present.

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Great Streets Facade Improvement Program

Neighborhood business districts are the front door of our neighborhoods. A welcoming, vibrant business district sends a powerful, positive message, just as a poorly maintained or vacant row of storefronts conveys a negative impression.

The Façade Improvement Matching Grant Program works to revitalize and sustain the economic vitality of the city's businesses and commercial districts through public/private investments in façade projects for commercial properties.

Currently BNA administers the Great Streets Facade Improvement Grant for the City of Minneapolis. Depending on the geographic location, businesses could receive up to \$10,000 toward their project (with between a 1:0.5-1:2 private match). If you or someone you know is a business owner and would like more information on the grant, please contact the BNA office.

Youth job opportunities through STEP-UP

STEP-UP is a summer jobs program for Minneapolis youth, ages 14-21. After STEP-UP interns complete training, they are eligible to work for pay at Minneapolis businesses and nonprofit organizations to gain job experience, explore career interests, and build professional skills. Community garden plots

BNA oversees the community garden located at Bethel Lutheran Church on 16th Avenue and 40th Street. There are 13 garden plots that are 10 feet x 20 feet, and currently a few are available to rent for this grow-

ing season. There is a \$30 fee, plus a refundable \$50 deposit, for each plot which includes water, access to seeds, and various plant donations. There is a limit of one garden plot per household and preference is given to Bancroft residents. If you're interested, contact the BNA office. Eligible people will be notified by April.
